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Your Essential Guide to the Day's Happenings

### POLITICS & GOVERNANCE

- Opposition parties at a meeting hosted by PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari decided to go ahead with their individual plans for anti-government protests after Eid-ul-Fitr, but agreed to convene again at a multiparty conference after Ramazan to explore prospects of a joint strategy. Talking to media after the meeting, Bilawal said the "decisive movement" would aim at "establishing supremacy of parliament and restoration of real democracy". PML-N is holding a meeting on Monday in which it would chart out its own plans for agitation.
- Prime Minister Imran Khan, in a reaction to the Opposition meeting for planning protests against the government, blamed them (the opposition) for the crises facing the country. At another meeting with the business community, he repeated the tidings of the good days ahead.
- Election Commission of Pakistan has been one of the early victims of dysfunctional government opposition relationship. New members of ECP have not been appointed despite the lapse of constitutional deadline because the process for nomination, involving consultations between the prime minister and the opposition leader, has not been completed as yet.
- Pakistani officials believe that compliance with the FATF correction plan may not be enough to get the country out of the illicit financing watchdog's grey list. They insist that a diplomatic effort would be required ahead of next plenary of FATF from June 16 -21 in Orlando (Florida, US) for achieving a positive outcome. The observation was made after the recent Asia-Pacific Group (FATF's regional arm's) meetings in China, where Pakistani delegation struggled to satisfy the body of progress made by the country on strengthening its counter-terror financing and anti-money laundering regimes.
- The government is considering appointment of a National Security Adviser. The vacant slot has not been filled since the government took office last August. The vacancy is reportedly being filled up with a view to engage India after the formation of new government there.
- Prime Minister Imran Khan will visit Saudi Arabia from March 30 31 to attend the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) summit. The summit and Mr Khan's participation in it have gained added significance in view of the US - Iran confrontation. Saudi Arabia has meanwhile convened meeting of the Arab League and GCC on the sidelines of the summit to rally support for US attack on Iran.

#### **ECONOMY**

- A comprehensive <u>tax reforms program</u> to increase tax to GDP ratio to 17 per cent by 2024 has been prepared for which benchmarks in 10 key areas have been set.
- State Bank is expected to further raise the <u>bank interest rates</u> by another 100bps from 10.75 percent to 11.75 percent in the upcoming monetary policy expected to be announced today (Monday). It would be the seventh consecutive rate hike.
- <u>Tax relief for salaried class</u> is likely to be withdrawn in the budget for next fiscal year for meeting revenue generation targets.
- Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi, on his two-day visit to Kuwait, has extended invitation to the Kuwaiti businessmen to invest in Pakistan. Mr Qureshi met his counterpart Sabah Al Khalid Al Sabah at an Iftar dinner where he advocated the economic diplomacy drive by the PTI government.

# **SOUTH ASIA**

- <u>Exit polls from Indian elections</u> that concluded on Sunday suggest that BJP would return to power. Some believe BJP could return with a bigger majority.
- <u>Trade between Pakistan and Sri Lanka</u> has reportedly been halted due to the anti-Muslim sentiment there
  in the aftermath of Easter Day bombings. Muslim community of Sri Lanka, which had been a major buyer
  of Pakistani products, is besieged and facing violence.

#### **CHINA**

Huawei founder and CEO Ren Zhengfei has said that his company has readied itself for US crackdown by
 reducing reliance on American components for its products. President Donald Trump effectively barred
 Huawei from the US market on Wednesday and added it to a list which would restrict US sales to the
 firm amid an escalating trade war with Beijing.

### THE MIDDLE EAST

• In the <u>strongest warning to Iran as yet</u>, in the ongoing crisis in Persian Gulf, US President Donald Trump has threatened to "officially end" Iran if its interests in the region are attacked.



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
